



Sermon Themes

July 6th - Galatians 6:1-10; Luke 10:1-11. THE WORK OF RESTORATION.

Paul addresses the issue of restoring a person to the fellowship of the church when there has been a separation or a transgression. He emphasizes that this is to be done in a spirit of gentleness as we bear one another's burdens. Each person is to examine their own work with a spirit of humility, working for the good of all. "Do not grow weary in doing what is right." In Luke, Jesus sends out seventy-two to prepare for his arrival in various towns saying, "Peace to this house!" He warns them that some will receive and some will not.

July 13th - Colossians 1:1-5,9-14; Luke 10:25-37. LOVE IN ACTION

Paul gives thanks for the faithful Christians in Colossi, then gives them encouragement to continue in the good work they have been doing. He prays that they may remain strong, having "endurance and patience, joyfully giving thanks to the Father...who has rescued us from the power of darkness." In Luke, Jesus responds to the man who asks what he must do to inherit eternal life by telling the story of the priest and Levite who turn a blind eye to a man beaten and lying on the side of the road, but the Samaritan ministers to his needs. This story connects one's adherence to the spirit of the law by showing mercy.

July 20th - Colossians 1:15-23; Luke 10:38-42 - THE UNIVERSAL CHRIST

Paul makes a very powerful statement about the nature of the Universal Christ through whom "all things in heaven and on earth were created." He repeats this sentiment four times in this passage, then reminds them that they have been reconciled to God through Jesus, the Christ. Even as Paul states this central truth, Luke tells the story of Jesus' visit to the home of Mary and Martha, and Mary choosing "the better part" by sitting at Jesus' feet as he teaches the people.

July 27th - Luke 11:1-13 - THE POWER OF PERSISTENCE.

In this passage, we have Luke's version of what we call "The Lord's Prayer," a much more concise version. He then follows the teaching of this prayer by telling the story of a person who was persistent in asking what he wanted from a friend until the friend relented. He then follows this with instructions to "ask, seek, and knock." He asserts that the door will be opened, and concludes by saying that "the Heavenly Father will give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him!"

41st Annual Session of the California-Pacific Conference

Report by Laddie Perez, Church Lay Leader and AC Lay Member

First, I want to thank Laguna Country UMC for electing me to represent you as one of the two Annual Conference Lay Members (Meg Estrada is the other AC Lay Member).



The 41st Annual Session of the California-Pacific Conference took place virtually (California, Hawaii, Guam, and Saipan) on June 11-14 and in person in Indian Wells, California. I've attended in person, and Meg attended virtually. The theme of the 2025 Session was "Ending Spiritual and Physical Hunger: Cherish."

The 2024 General Conference passed several proposed amendments to The United Methodist Constitution. These unique pieces of legislation will only become official once they are ratified by a two-thirds affirmative vote of the aggregate of members to the annual conferences, meaning all United Methodists all over the world. Whether it's a yes or a no, every vote counts. We voted on each of these four amendments. Results of the denomination-wide votes will be announced in the fall.

The amendment topics were worldwide regionalization, gender and ability inclusion, racial justice, and educational requirements for clergy members.

Immediately after we cast our votes on worldwide regionalization, voting was suspended because Google crashed, and we had to wait until it was fixed and came back online in the afternoon. No paper ballots, we all voted electronically using the Meeting Pulse platform. It was a challenge because of wi-fi issues and delays in voting. There were over 500 voting members logging in to wi-fi to vote, and I had to use my own data line to vote.

Other legislative highlights were:

- We passed the 2026 Conference budget.
- We passed a resolution to stand with our immigrant neighbors.
- We passed a resolution to begin a process to divest from fossil fuels.
- We passed a resolution to commit to not renewing military leases on O'ahu.
- We passed a resolution on defending free speech, opposing the repression of advocacy for Palestinian rights.
- We passed a recommendation to close Westmont United Methodist Church in Pomona Valley, California. The five remaining members of Westmont UMC will be transferred to Montclair UMC. Pomona Valley Chinese UMC, a nesting congregation at Westmont UMC, is currently exploring the possible transfer of the property title.
- We did not amend the way apportionments will be calculated and instead passed a recommendation to do further study into a new calculation formula for the coming year.

These are just the highlights, and there were more legislations that were submitted and voted on. If you would like to get more information and/or read the legislations, you may find them at calpacumc.org/ac2025.

Other livestream highlights:

- Bishop Dottie Escobedo-Frank challenged us to be miracle workers, monster slayers, way makers, light bearers, truth seekers, love givers, and cherish peddlers.
- We heard from five individuals and ministries across our connection, including topics like immigration, disaster relief, cherishing communities, and property development.
- Conference committees and leaders shared updates from their areas of ministry, including an address from Erin Hawkins, Executive Director of Connectional Ministries, who shared about where our murmuration has been and where we are headed.
- Nineteen candidates were commissioned, ordained, or transferred during the Commission and Ordination Service.
- Morning Worship Services were awesome and very uplifting, especially the music!
- One of my favorites, baptism of a young child (this happens every year)!

It was great to see so many young people; they were participating and going to the mics to ask questions, to agree, or not disagree on legislation. It was well attended in person by members from Southern California, Hawaii, and Guam.

It was not just all business. When we were not in plenaries, there were workshops and activities like a labyrinth, yoga/meditative prayer, karaoke, film screenings, open mic, trivia night, book club, a sound bath (not sure what that is), and a pop-up choir. I went to a workshop on Nigeria and did the labyrinth.

Just a heads up, Bishop Dottie has been making unannounced visits to churches to worship with congregations. There are over 370 churches in the California-Pacific Conference. Are we lucky enough to get an unannounced visit from her this coming year, or are we even on her radar?

Lastly, if you feel you are being called to serve as an Annual Conference Lay Member or an Alternate Annual Conference Lay Member, talk to Pastor David. I am also available to answer questions about being a Lay Member. It has been an honor and a privilege to serve as one of your Annual Conference Lay Members. Thank you for the opportunity, thanks be to God!

Next Year's Annual Conference Session will be held June 17-20, 2026.

LWUMF 2025-26 Scholarship Application

Founded in 1987, the Laguna Woods United Methodist Foundation, Inc. ("LWUMF") is a California not-for-profit religious corporation that supports Laguna Country United Methodist Church ("LCUMC") and its programs. LWUMF Scholarships support young LCUMC members – a vital ministry for LCUMC's future. The first LWUMF Scholarship awards in 2005 began with principal funding by the Connie Burgess Fund and increased by a bequest from Jean Scarborough. In 2013, the Aaron H. and Vera B. Bergen Scholarship was launched with Vera Bergen's generous \$100,000.00 gift to LWUMF.

Both awards support young LCUMC members who have been active in the Church and are accepted for enrollment in an approved academic program at an accredited higher education institution (e.g., university, college, or community college) and on an academic track required by the institution to complete the degree or certificate. The Bergen scholarship is for students who earn and maintain a cumulative grade average of "B" (3.000 on 4.000 point scale) or higher, whether a graduating high school senior accepted for college admission or a current full-time college student.




